# **1 EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

Taking into account the lack of knowledge and practical skills of micro, small and medium enterprises (MSMEs), which hamper them to participate in the global value chain as well as leverage the benefits from the respective Free Trade Agreements, Recognising the opportunities to play a key role in reducing barriers to trade and helping to develop greater integration within the AANZFTA region, AANZFTA Sub-Committee on Standards, Technical Regulation and Conformity Assessment Procedures (SC-STRACAP), in collaboration with the ASEAN Coordinating Committee on Micro, Small, and Medium Enterprises (ACCMSME) and the ASEAN Consultative Committee on Standards and Quality – Prepared Foodstuff Product Working Group (ACCSQ-PFPWG), and its related bodies support awareness-raising and adoption of international standards and understanding of food related legislations and regulations by the MSMEs in the AANZFTA region, providing a platform for both ASEAN and ANZ MSMEs, MSME enablers, and government officials who are involved in the international food industry, in particular, the processed/prepared foods sector, to enhance their knowledge and expertise in terms of international prepared food standards, thereby gaining market access and reducing barriers to trade within the AANZFTA region.

The Food, Agriculture, and Forestry (FAF) sector was selected as it is one of the twelve ASEAN Priority Integration Sectors (PIS) and with 95% of businesses in this sector being SMEs, FAF plays an important role to (a) deepen economic integration with the global value chain; (b) accelerate strong income growth; and (c) leverage the expanding middle class. This project focuses on the processed/prepared foods sector.

For a start, the focus of capacity building design will be on areas key to market facilitation which includes relevant food legislation, regulations, international standards (e.g. ISO 22000, Codex) and regulatory standards for traditional and emerging food sectors. The project will support the capacity development for MSMEs on International Prepared Food Standards through a two-phase implementation approach, namely:

- Phase 1: to conduct needs assessment and design a regional capacity building programme for MSMEs and MSME enablers in ASEAN and ANZ region; and,
- Phase 2: to implement the capacity building programme.

This assignment focuses on Phase I of the project to design the required capacity building programme with following key elements:

a. Project scoping (including a needs assessment) and defining the specific areas of the proposed capacity building programme for MSMEs, including to identify regulations/standards to be covered, coverage of processed food product and specific target audience (e.g. business associations, and or government agencies/officials responsible for developing MSMEs in the food sector) who will benefit from the training/ capacity building activities. The ultimate beneficiaries are the MSMEs doing business in the processed/ prepared foods sector. The government agencies/ officials and business associations will also be the beneficiaries, given this project aims to support

them to conduct capacity buildings for MSMEs in the international prepared food sector. The coverage should include the relevant regulations and standards from ASEAN, Australia and New Zealand regions, and may include, among others, the areas recommended by the ASEAN private sector. The scope of coverage may include but not limited to the following topics:

- i. ASEAN General Standard for the Labelling of Pre-packaged Foods which was finalised in 2016;
- ii. ASEAN Common Food Control Requirement;
- iii. Mutual Recognition Arrangement for Inspection and Certification on Food Hygiene for Prepared Foodstuff Products;
- iv. Corresponding ASEAN Food Safety Policy, ASEAN Food Safety Regulatory Framework (AFSRF), and Harmonization of Food Standards in ASEAN.
- b. Design a regional capacity building programme for MSMEs in the AANZFTA region and its related implementation work plans, both regional and country level, for the selected target audience on the specific identified areas/ scope defined under project scoping in above paragraph;
- c. Review and collate/ develop the information and training materials/ guidelines relevant to the Regional Capacity Building Program, that can be re-used and widely disseminated to raise awareness and understanding (where feasible), such as online training modules and guides; and,
- d. Sharing of relevant information regarding regulations and food standards imposed by countries in the AANZFTA region via the ASEAN SME Service Centre, ASEAN website and the AANZFTA website.

## **2** SCOPE OF WORK

#### 2.1 THE ASSIGNMENT

#### I. BACKGROUND

- 1. It is noted that MSMEs in general have limited information on how to access markets, and are not well aware of the issues related to international requirements or standards. Lack of technical knowledge may prevent these enterprises from participating in the global value chains, and thus poses additional technical barriers to trade. As a result, MSMEs' contribution to exports remains small.
- 2. Providing information platforms and capacity building programmes can therefore play an important role in creating greater (a) awareness of international standards (particularly on processed food) that would facilitate market access and (b) understanding of food related legislations and regulations in the AANZFTA region. Ultimately, equipping MSMEs with better knowledge and technical expertise to comply with regional and international standards of food safety products and quality standard requirements will contribute to MSMEs' deeper participation in the international market and regional value chains.

#### **II. PURPOSE OF THE ASSIGNMENT**

3. AANZFTA is seeking the services of a team of consultants who will provide technical assistance and support to undertake the activities to design capacity building programme on international prepared food standards for MSME and MSME enablers (e.g. business associations) in ASEAN, Australia and New Zealand. The consultants will also provide technical inputs on drafting the implementation plan for the capacity building programme.

#### **III. CONSULTANT'S SCOPE OF WORK AND ACTIVITIES**

- 4. The consultants are requested to:
  - a. Undertake a study to (i) review the current needs for information and capacity building among the MSMEs in the AANZFTA region; (ii) review what processed food products to be covered for the capacity building; and, (iii) review the existing materials including standards and regulations available that are relevant to the MSMEs in the AANZFTA region. Study methods should be clearly described in an inception report and include desktop research as well as consultations with relevant stakeholders, including government officials, MSMEs and business association. The study shall generate needs assessment that will be the foundation to design the required capacity building.
  - b. Design a regional capacity building programme for MSMEs and MSME enablers in the international prepared food sector, including implementation

work plans, identification of pre-existing training materials to be utilised and production of additional training materials that could be re-used and disseminated/ published widely. The focus would be on areas key to market facilitation which includes relevant food legislation, regulations, international standards (e.g. ISO 22000, Codex), and regulatory standards for emerging food sectors such as those listed in paragraph 5 below.

- c. Facilitate a regional workshop for related ASEAN and ANZ Committees, relevant ASEAN and ANZ SME agencies, food regulators to deliberate the results of the needs assessment study, including design of regional capacity building program, national implementation work plan. This workshop is meant to include private sector representatives, particularly MSMEs, in the process of designing the regional and national capacity building programme. The consultants will prepare workshop agenda and materials, facilitate the discussion during the workshop, and prepare a workshop report including workshop's recommendation.
- d. Consolidate a list of up-to-date (i) regulations and food standards imposed by AMS and ANZ countries; and, (ii) contact points within the ASEAN and ANZ regulatory bodies for sharing with the public online with support from the ASEAN Secretariat and focal points from AANZFTA parties.
- e. Consult Project Advisory Team, AANZFTA and ASEAN Bodies, ASEAN Secretariat, as well as relevant officials, MSMEs, and business associations dealing with prepared foods to collect input and seek confirmation. Communication exchange will be done through emails, face-to-face consultation or skype interviews.
- f. Produce outputs that will be finalised through email communications by the ASEAN Secretariat and consultants.
- 5. Key focus areas that will be covered for the selected food product include:
  - a. marking and labeling (including re-labeling of products at ports, language requirements for storage and cooking instructions and nutritional labels);
  - b. authorization of food ingredients, additives and flavours; and,
  - c. contaminant limits and analytical methods.

In addition, regulatory standards for emerging food sectors such as the following are to be included as well:

- a. functional foods (e.g. how regulators address the grey areas between food and health);
- b. elderly nutrition;
- c. valorisation of food waste;
- d. natural health and supplementary products;
- e. health claims made for specific foods; and,
- f. the use of novel ingredients.

  - a. Inception report, detailing the approaches and methodologies as well as workplan to carry out the activities;
  - b. Needs assessment report on MSME capacity building in the international prepared food sector, with 2 focus areas: (1) key international food standards to facilitate market access; and (2) regulatory standards for emerging food sectors;
  - c. A regional capacity building program and its implementation work plans for MSMEs, MSMEs enablers and relevant AANZFTA Party government officials in the above-mentioned 2 focus areas of the international prepared food sector;
  - d. Training materials to support the capacity building program, which include training materials for the MSMEs and training materials for the trainers based on the implementation work plans;
  - e. Catalogue of relevant information regarding regulations and food standards in the AANZFTA region, as well as the relevant contact points within regulatory bodies publicly shared in the SME Portal of the ASEAN SME Service Centre and on ASEAN/AANZFTA websites;
  - f. Agenda, materials, and report for the regional consultation workshop; and,
  - g. Final report.

- d. Brief discussion on the consultant's or firm's past experience in undertaking similar work and brief summary of projects undertaken;
